



From the President's Desk

Greetings fellow photogs;

I think that everyone who attended the last program night seemed to be positive about the new location and the equipment available to us. It really is a classroom environment and the audio/visio equipment is of good quality, effective and easy to use. Those in attendance seemed satisfied with the instruction presented by Sam Shaw.

Thank you, **Loye**, for making the arrangements. Our judge at the last competition meeting was different. Even though he was not strictly of the PSA mold, I believe that he did a good job of rating and explaining his reasons for his marks. What I appreciated the most was his detailed discussion of the perceived strengths and weaknesses of the entries. He brought a different perspective but one that provided many useful possibilities for fine tuning our images.

Thank you, **David**, for arranging his time with us. The next couple of items are not the most pleasant issues I get paid the big bucks to address, so I'll do it in a short and sweet fashion.

During the judging of images in competition, we are not supposed to register our displeasure with the judge's comments loud enough that others can hear us. We don't have to agree with the judge and we can believe he/she is downright moronic, but in good conduct, we should keep it to ourselves. Let's do that.

Along the same vein, conversations loud enough to be heard by those of us who are trying to listen to the judge are really in poor taste. So, having learned my lesson early on in my voyage as your president, I will, once again, bring this issue before you and you can decide how to conduct the retrieval of our prints. Bring your best idea. We can use it.

Settings used were ISO 100, 14mm lens, at F22 1.6 seconds I took around 200 photos at this location that night. I did two different exposures and blended them together.

Sand Harbor is a State Park and Beach is just south of Incline Village NV. This shot was taken around 2:00am in the morning just after the moon set. I had scouted the location earlier in the evening to make sure the chair was still there and to check access points. This was a time exposure of 30 seconds F 4.0 at 2000 ISO. I light painted the chair for about 10 seconds using a small flashlight. I then turned off the light and rushed up into the chair for the rest of the exposure. I repeated the process about 15 times until I felt like I got what I had envisioned.

Pigeon Point Calm by Art Serabian

This image was made using a tripod mounted Nikon D700, Nikkor lens 24-70mm@63mm, 10s, f/13, ISO 200, auto white balance, manual exposure, and matrix metering. A neutral density filter was used to allow for a long exposure that resulted in the smooth water and tonal sky. The time of year was August in the late afternoon, and the location was Pigeon Point Light Station SHP (www.parks.ca.gov/PigeonPoint). The camera raw file (NEF) was processed using Adobe Camera Raw and post processing was done with Photoshop CS6 and Nik Silver Efex Pro 2. The final print is on Epson "Ultra Premium Photo Paper Luster" paper and printed using an Epson 3880 with Epson's Advanced Black and White mode (ABW).



USAF Academy Protestant Chapel print was taken in August of last year. Settings were: f/4, 1/60 sec., ISO 250. She used her Panasonic GX1 Micro 4/3 camera with an Olympus 14-150 mm (28-300 mm) at 14 mm. She did use her monopod for support.


Elements 13 to was used to process her RAW image. Adjusted Exposure, Highlight and Shadows as needed in the RAW editor, then in Elements she adjusted Highlights, Shadows and Levels as needed. The image was saved as a TIFF file and sent to Costco for printing.

We actually were the only ones in the Chapel, with just an occasional visitor. When we were done, the docent gave us a detailed explanation of the design highlights of the chapel, with many incorporating Air Force traditions. Outside we heard constant warnings to stay under cover due to a lightning storm passing over head, so we gladly stayed inside.

PSA Image Analysis Course Completion

Art Serabian has successfully completed the PSA Image Analysis Course. The online course is designed for individual members of PSA who wish to know more about photography and what may constitute a pleasant photographic image. The course work helps the student learn what to say in the analysis or evaluation of a photograph within a PSA framework. Photographic Exposure

ISO, Lens aperture and Shutter speed are the three most fundamental issues when dealing with exposure.

Photography is the capture of light and it depends lighting conditions, a on the Photographer to select which camera hardware and software to use to his/her advantage in capturing the correct amount of light.

Raising the ISO setting on the camera will certainly bring more light in, however, a high ISO setting will bring about more noise in the image. Opening the Lens aperture will also bring more light into the camera, but the depth of field can be compromised. A slower shutter speed will allow more light to the image, but the lower shutter speed will result in a blurred image.

The correct exposure is determined by the priority of the photographer. If one is photographing a landscape, then the priority would probably be depth of field, in which case an aperture setting of say f-16 might be appropriate.

For action (sports, children, animals) a fast shutter speed would most likely be the photographers priority.

In darker or indoor poor higher ISO setting would be the priority, in order to bring more light to the image.



The basic approach would be to set your priority and make adjustments to the other elements that will give you the most satisfactory exposure.

Typically, depth of field priority for landscapes, higher shutter speed for action and higher ISO for poor lighting conditions. In a nutshell, adjusting these three settings will help the understanding of exposure and by experimenting with them, an appropriate solution should avail itself to you.




Program Night Review

The judging of the San Joaquin Valley Internation- Ward, FPSA, EPSA for "Days of Wine and Rosal Salon was successfully held in Madera at the Social Services Building at Yosemite and Vineyard. Other medal winners in Creative Division were Lunches and a dinner were catered by Jim Cunningham. Again Shirley Ward was General Chair- from USA. man, and Tom Frasier and Samuel G. Shaw, FPSA, MPSA, were at the computers.

There were 865 Color images and 436 Creative images judged by Jennifer Doerrie, Byron Hindman, Hon PSA, FPSA, and David Meisenheimer, FPSA,GMPSA, on Saturday, March 28th. Visitors enjoyed the many images shown on the screen.

The judges selected the Best of Show in PID Color, "Purple Water Lily" by Sarah Donner, USA. There were 4 more medal winners from the USA, and Sharon McLemore, Stockton, won Best Entry by a San Joaquin Valley member, entitled "Night Ride".

Other entries and medal winners in Color were from Hong Kong, Indonesia, England, Canada, United Arab Emirates, and Singapore.

In the PID Creative Division, the judges selected from 436 entries for Best of Show, "Bald Eagle Glow" by Cindy Lynch, USA. The Best Image entered by members of San Joaquin Valley was won by **Shirley**

Foreign entries in Creative were from Macau, Hong Kong, Sweden, and Australia.
