






Citadel, Hue Vietman

Willow Catkins

This image of a trio of willow catkins (flower spikes) was taken at the Kaweah Oaks Preserve in early February. Willows are nearly always close to a water source, in this case a creek. The main difficulty was getting this branch separated from the others clustered around it. With the camera on a 10 sec timer I pulled the neighboring branches away and hoped this branch would stop moving in time for the shutter release. The image was taken with a Canon 60D using a 24-85 lens: ISO 200, 125/sec & f11. The file was processed in Lightroom and Photoshop.

Mighty Oak Tree



This photo was taken above Millerton Lake while seeking some new images of California Poppies. While doing so, I became aware of this beautiful oak tree that was outlined by a great sky, and surrounded by flowers at its base. As you can see, this oak tree is just starting to leaf out, exposing the structure of the tree. The flowers at the trees base complemented the sky colors. How could I resist?

Nikon D800E, 36.3 magapixals, ISO of 100, at f16. A carbon fiber tripod with a Really Right Stuff BH 55 ball head was used.





Carousel Horse Topography

This image started out as a "Shoot the Fair" entry of a Carousel Horse. I used a Nikon D300 with a 50mm (75mm equivalent to 35mm), ISO 200 and 1/5300 sec at f/3.2 - hand held, hence the fast shutter speed and sharp image. The raw file (NEF) post processing was done in Photoshop where I increased contrast, saturation and vibrancy to give the images some "pop."



I used Corel PaintShop Pro X2 to create the effect you see in the final print. Corel Paint-Shop Pro is marketed as a photo editor but since I use Photoshop, the photo editing features are of little value, but the package does have a very large suite of filters, effects and treatments. "Topography" was an effect that really triggered my imagination. After some serious time "didling" with the effect settings, I applied the effect to the original Carousel Horse and this is what I got. Yes, it looks blurry, but when I zoomed to print resolution, the magic appeared!



Here is a section around the eye of the Carousel Horse with the "Topography" effect viewed at print resolution. This is what the image looks like when held for viewing. In my opinion, it's one of those images that must be viewed at arm's length to be truly appreciated.

Hyperfocal Distance

Back in June 2016, Pat Rhames had image of the night, *Tiles, Dunes and Sky.*



This was his "about the image":

David Hunter and I travelled to Eureka Dunes in Death Valley in late December, 2015. This shot is of the Dunes taken from South, facing North. The time was early-afternoon but we had the clouds seen in the shot diffusing the light to some degree. There were still strong shadows, but they actually helped in several other shots.

This image was rendered as an HDR composit using 9 bracketed frames, one stop apart. Because the clouds were moving fast across the sky and the duplicate images were obvious, I selected one of the frames to "drop in" above the horizon line to create a "normal" sky.

The image was captured with my trusty Nikon D800E, mounted with a Nikkor 24-70 f/2.8 lens. Aperture set to f/22 and focal length to 24mm. Hyperfocal focusing was used to keep the image sharp all the way through. (At 24mm the hyperfocal distance is 3 ft.) A sturdy tripod was used, camera shutter mode set to mirror up with a remote shutter release. The camera's Virtual Horizon feature was employed to square the focal plane to level.

In post process, raw camera adjustments were made in Lightroom. Photoshop was used for refinement with additional work done on it using NIK software including Viveza 2, Color Efex Pro 4, Silver Efex Pro 2 and Sharpener Pro 3. Filters of significance included a subtle luminosity S curve applied in Color Efex and a subtle magenta filter effect in Silver Efex.

David Hunter demands credit for dragging my aged body into the desert at that time of the year. It was the coldest place I have ever been at +15 degrees the first night.

After I read about his image, I asked: How does one determine the hyperfocal distance?

This was Pat's reply:

Hyperfocal distance is a sliding value determined by aperture and the focal distance of the lens. It is used to achieve a field of focus from x to infinity. As an example, in my image, just sent, the focal length of the lens was set to 24mm and the aperture to f/22. The math involved creates a hyperfocal distance of 2 ft 10 inches. That puts everything from 1 ft. 5 inches to infinity, in focus (another mathematical concept involving "Circle of Confusion"). But for the common man, the image appears to be in focus from roughly one foot to infinity.

One can do the calculations, manually, I suppose, but the easiest way to find it is to use one of several iPhone apps that exist. I use one called Simple DoF, it is free. Here is a screen capture:



The real value of this app, however, is that you can determine the field of focus that will exist for any given aperture/focal length combination. I, literally, use it all the time to make sure that my subject will be in focus, as desired.
