At a camera club meeting last year, a member had submitted a photo entitled "My First Camera" This gave me an idea to shoot my first camera and practice using an off-camera flash since I happen to still have that first camera. I have been wanting to get more consistent results when using a flash and haven't really used a flash off camera too often, so this became an opportunity for me to practice.

I set up a little area with a black cloth and started using a bare flash mounted on a light stand, then moved to using an umbrella with the flash. Ultimately, I preferred the photos with the umbrella, such as this one, as I was able to control the highlights a little better. It turned out to be a fun little project for me.

I shot this with my Nikon D810 on a tripod using a 50mm lens at f/2.8, 1/80 second. I used Lightroom to make minor adjustments primarily to the highlights and shadows.





I discovered this scene while driving to Glacier Point. A break in the tree line along the road presented this view. Luckily, there was a nearby pull out where I could park and get out to take some shots. I started with my 35mm lens, then switched to my 24-70mm lens to isolate the granite peaks a little more. The day was overcast and the light was a little flat so I started playing with a black and white conversion on my computer and came up with this version.

I shot this with my Nikon D810 at 58mm using my 24-70mm lens at f/8, 1/400 second, ISO 200. I used Lightroom to make initial adjustments from the RAW file and converted to black and white in Silver Efex Pro. I cropped the photo to a 16:9 aspect ratio for more of a panoramic look.





Study at Night By Lori Azevedo



I have been following several other photographers in social media who specialize in still life photography. My plan was not to copy but to find what I like and create a style with objects I had around the house.

I like darker images, especially images in bronze and black tones. I searched through my family collections of old books and found two with worn covers. The books are actually grandparent's bibles in both Norwegian and Portuguese. The lamp was one I have on my bookshelf. The glasses are my husbands.

I shot several different arrangements on my dining room table. I turned the lamp different ways and moved the books from back to front. I was always keeping in mind triangular shapes and angles. Nothing sitting straight to the lens. The backdrop is just a black foam board. This is the final photo which I liked the best.

My Nikon D850 camera set up was f2.8, ISO 1250, and exposure 1/60 sec. I had to edit out glare in the eye glass lenses and some glare from glass around the candle. I did light up the books and candle slightly with a cell phone light. Finish touches were just a little cleanup of spots and burning to reduce light on the background.





Eiffel Tower Underbelly

Sun Breaks onto Aspen

This photo was taken on 10/20/24, in a grove of aspens that occur along the June Lake Loop (hwy



158), not too far from the Aerie Crag Picnic area. It's a favorite spot for photographers and leaf peepers in the fall. This photo is the first where I've been satisfied with the results. Here, I found a spot where the sunlight was strongly blocked by some taller trees, but a small gap in the canopy allowed one aspen, and the grass below, to receive more light. I used my crop sensor Canon 80D, with a Tamron 18-135 mm, set at 67 mm. It is likely taken as the 80D is much lighter than my 5D. The exposure was ISO 1600, f16 at 1/125 sec. As to editing, I started in Lightroom, reducing highlights to -100 to remove some severe highlights with the direct sunlight hitting the subject aspen. As noted by the judge, I was very much intending an "impressionistic" effect. To obtain this, also in Lightroom, I added softness on the global image by moving the clarity slider all the way down to -100, and by dropping texture down globally to -31. Before importing to Photoshop I also added two vertical linear gradients in Lightroom, on the left and right sides, to decrease exposure (by about -0.6) and to drop clarity even further at the margins. In Photoshop I then cropped the image (it was shot horizontally) so that two larger aspen in the foreground would make a sort of vertical frame. I then used Adobe generative fill to fill out the top of the subject as-

pen that was clipped in the original (I was aiming for the light on the grass originally; I would perhaps need to re-do this by manual cloning to submit to Council?). Additional cloning eliminated distracting dead branches at the margin and blown out highlights in the subject aspen and grasses. I then added a global Orton effect (a layer of high blur and contrast, here set to 23% opacity) for additional softness. Other gradients and masks decrease exposure at the top of the image and brightness on the subject aspen and grass below. I then created a B&W layer of the whole, using a mask to hide the subject aspen and set the opacity of this layer to 40%. This further decreases vibrance and saturation of the background- in effect, highlighting the subject by subtraction. I think three key edits achieved the "impressionistic" effect: 1) moving the clarity sliders down in Lightroom, 2) adding an Orton effect in Photoshop, and 3) adding a B&W layer, also in Photoshop, and using opacity to reduce saturation and vibrance.





Orchid Still Life

As far as post processing, I used Photoshop build contrast in the orchid with multiple curves layers, some dodging and burning, and masks to make sure the background stayed black.
