From the President's Desk

Greetings fellow photogs;

Before I get cranked up, one correction from last month. The website I reported was misspelled (by me, of course); it should have been www.megalithicireland.com.

There are several things I would like to mention. First, don't forget about Fotoclave, November 7-9. I hope to see all of you there.


Secondly, it has been brought to my attention that some of us are still having problems getting digital submissions sized correctly. Dennis has a healthy head of hair, but he's losing it quickly over this problem. I've been charged with trying to remedy this issue.

Both our own website (www.fresnocameraclub.org) and Council (www.sjvccc.org) have good discussion on how to size your digital images but here is a quick tip. If the image is horizontally formatted, size the width first to 1400 pixels and then check the vertical dimension (it is usually automatically set by the programming) If it is less than or equal to 1050, you're set. If it is larger than 1050, you have to change it (the vertical dimension) to 1050 and let the programming set the horizontal dimension. It may be something less than 1400.

Obviously, the same holds true with a vertically formatted image. Set the vertical dimension, first, and then check the horizontal dimension. Again, if the horizontal dimension exceeds 1400 you must manually set it to 1400 and let the programming set the vertical dimension.

The next critical step is to make sure the file is no larger than 1 megabyte in size. With both Photoshop and Elements, that task is pretty easy, but if you are not using one of those applications, it could be more difficult.

I am researching a no cost solution for those who do not have a copy of Photoshop or Elements. I've located a free image resizer at http://download.cnet.com/Free-Picture-Resizer/3000-12511_4-10297789.html and will do some testing with it to see if holds



a potential solution. I'll report more on this, shortly. In the meantime, if you fall into that non-Photoshop/Elements group, and if you are feeling brave, download it and give it a whirl. Let me know what you think of it.

Continuation of my "Photo Excursion Lessons" from last month. I discussed the issue of relying on a "good" GPS system in last month's letter. I don't want to belabor the subject, but I think it should be obvious that a "good GPS system" is something other than your iPhone. Use something that is going to allow you to concentrate on driving and does not require cell phone coverage to work. Some parts of the World don't have cell coverage. Personally, I purchased the latest Garmin Nuvi version before I left and also took the old one I owned as a backup. Don't forget to obtain the latest version of the mapping software of wherever it is you're headed. I cannot over emphasize the importance of "good GPS system".

Lesson Two: Prepare for the unexpected and in some cases, bring backup equipment. As examples, I offer these two experiences.

About the Image of the Month

Big Bend Stars

This image was made in the early morning hours after a meteor shower above Big Bend at Millerton Lake. The predawn light was just starting to lighten the sky and thus catching the reflections on the water. The exposure was 30 seconds, F2.8, 14 mm. I stayed in this location all night and had an auto shutter trigger on the camera that was firing 30 sec exposures with a one second interval between all night long. I would check the camera every few hours for battery power.

Locked Up and Forgotten

Location: Eureka, Ca. Downtown Camera-Canon Full Frame 6D Lens: 70mm-200mm canon L lens

F-12 ISO-Auto Polarized Filter Hand Held-No tripod

While traveling to the Oregon Coast last year we stopped in Eureka, California few days to take pictures. We spent some time in the old downtown area



looking for interesting shots of the local architecture. While there I came upon an old building that was locked up and abandoned. I looked in the windows and found all this wonderful stuff to photograph, typewriters, old desks, etc. but could not access the building. I went around to the door and sure enough it was locked up. I decided to take a picture of the lock that kept me from entering the building. I always look for interesting simple things, and hidden objects that tell a story and probably have a lot of history. I took about 10-15 shots of the lock and was impressed with all the cobwebs that were hanging on the latch.

My post processing was Adobe Photoshop 10 where I adjusted the brightness/contrast and the saturation. I also cropped the image slightly. I then put the photo into Topaz HDR to give it some "pop" and also used the vignette tool around the edges to highlight the lock and the ever so important cobwebs.

Brewery Relics Hold Stories of the Past

The old Fresno Brewing Company building, at 100 M. Street in Downtown Fresno, is one of, if not the oldest commercial building in the City.

This image is in a second story room up a flight of spiraled stairs. The desk and child's rocking chair were found just as depicted. The satchel was nearby and I included it in the frame for foreground interest.

I was interested in the scene because it made me wonder about the activities of this place in the past. Particularly with the presence of the child's rocking chair.

The old roll-top desk with its rich grain and color is the focal point of the image.

This image is the HDR result of a bracketed series (9 frames, 1 stop) shot on a tripod with a Nikon D800E and a Nikkor f/2.8 24-70 lens. The focal length was 31mm, the aperture set to 2.8, shutter speed 1/40s, ISO 100, manual exposure, matrix mode.

Post processing involved Photoshop and Nik plugins.

My biggest obstacle was the amount of light coming through the windows. I took several steps to reduce the highlight quality of the windows to avoid competition with the focal point/s. I used significant darkening and lightening steps to draw the eye to first the satchel, then the desk and lastly the rocking chair. I also warmed up the interior light to match the very warm light of the window light once it had been reduced.



Bob graduated from California Polytechnic State University in 1953, majoring in Ornamental Horticulture. He worked for the City of Fresno for 37 years, and retired in 1990, as the Parks Manager. Bob was involved in numerous projects during his career with the City of Fresno, including the planning and construction of the Fulton Mall, landscaping of Storyland, the development of Woodward Park, and the Japanese Gardens. Bob Belcher Park was named in his honor after his many years of service to the City of Fresno. After retirement, Bob farmed 120 acres in Fowler. In the past, he was actively involved in many community organizations. He was a member of the Rotary Club of Fresno; and served on the Rotary Playland Storyland Board; the Advisory Board of the Salvation Army; and the Chamber of Commerce Landscape Coalition Committee. He was a

member of the Shinzen Garden Society; Tree Fresno; San Joaquin River Parkway Trust; California State University, Fresno Friends of the Arboretum; the Padrino's at Valley Children's Hospital; and the Sun Maid Raisin Grower's Best Management Practices Committee. Bob loved spending time with his family and friends, gardening, and photography. He traveled around the world to numerous countries and accomplished his goal of traveling to all 50 states. He had a passion for sports and loved the San Francisco Giants, 49ers, and Golden State Warriors. He was preceded in death by Tootsie, his wife of fifty years; and his daughter, Susan Pistacchio. Bob is survived by his daughter and son-in-law, Lindsey and Joe Miller; his grandchildren, Brooke and Will; his sister and brother-in-law, Ann and James Duvall; his best friend and companion, June Riechel; and his son-in-law, David Pistacchio.

First, about half way through my excursion, the brand new remote shutter release quit working. I don't know why (I do, but I'm too embarrassed to divulge that). Most of my shots were at f/22 and slow shutter speeds so keeping the camera steady (on a tripod, obviously) was imperative. Well, I had thought about this happening and had brought a "back up" with me. The only problem was I had failed to make sure all the parts were included. I forgot the cable.

Secondly, if you wear prescription glasses, bring a "back up" pair. Several days after the remote shutter release debacle, I was out in the "boonies", shooting, when one of the ear struts literally fell off the frame. It's tough reading the display on the back of the camera when you're blind. Fortunately, I had brought a second pair.

San Joaquin Valley Camera Club **Council - SJVCCC**


