

Also, our club (FCC) again has a booth at the Big Fresno Fair. It is located in the Fine Arts Building and not only displays the work of our members, but offers the general public the opportunity to learn about us and consider joining. This effort requires volunteers to man the booth. The scheduling of the duty roster is being managed by Carol LaGue. If you have some time and are willing to volunteer it to manning the booth, please contact Carol. Many members have done it. It's fun and easy.


With the points, above, made I am moving to the discussion of a different subject.

The reason David stood in for me, last month, is that I was off on a photography excursion, in Ireland. Ireland is, in many respects, a wonderful place. In some respects, it's challenging to get off the well beaten tourist track to get images that are relatively unique. If you want to get that kind of image, hare are a few lessons I feel I learned from that experience that I can pass on to you for your consideration in your own "photographic excursions". The comments are not exclusive to Ireland, but to any fairly remote site with limited photographic services.

Lesson One: Do your due diligence in researching what sites you want to shoot well before you begin your travels. Most countries have lots of web sites to help you do this. In my case,

www.magalithicireland.ie was most helpful. (There

are many others). But, more importantly (as is elaborated on in the next lesson point), identify and record into your itinerary the GPS coordinates of those sites. At least in the case of Ireland, many of the "roads" I had to travel on to get to my sites of interest were out in the Irish boondocks and had no



name. This little fun fact makes it immensely more "interesting" finding your locations. Nail down the GPS coordinates and it becomes much easier to get around.

There is an added bonus capability with the use of GPS coordinates. If you plug them into Google Maps, you can get down to the "Street View" of that geographical location and actually look at the terrain and photo site from the road. I found this most helpful in confirming the actual location of the site (don't trust the GPS coordinates of website discussion as they often use "general" locations) and in actually "looking" at the subject site using the 360 degree panning feature of Google Maps Street View.

I could go on, nearly forever, on this discussion so I will break it up into segments to be offered in following letters. Here are a few subject points I will try to discuss:

- More about GPS
- Prepare for the unexpected
- Be rational in planning your itinerary
- Exploration strategies that won't kill you
- Etc.


Balance

Bonsai Rock in Lake Tahoe is a very popular photo location even though it is hard to get to . I had a planned camping trip with family on the other side of the lake for the end of June. Just prior to leaving I researched different locations around the lake that I wanted to photograph if I got the opportunity. Half way through the trip my family and I were driving back up to the lake after visiting family in Carson City which put us in the perfect position to be passing Bonsai Rock close to sunset. Once we crested the hill and I saw the potential for a good sunset, I convinced my family to drop me off and hang out for a

couple of hours while I setup and photographed the rock. Settings used were ISO 100, 50mm lens, at F16 1/15th of second. I stated during the meeting that I used light painting for the shot, but looking at the exposure time I wouldn't of had enough time to light paint for this particular shot, I had several more shots as the sun went down that I light painted the front side of the rock. I took around 200 photos at this location that night.

The Night in Inca Trail and Red Capped Cardinal Feeding Baby

The Night in Inca Trail by Dr. Ling Nin

These two images were taken in the trip to Peru in July this year. After stayed in Cusco for two days to adjust high altitude, we started hiking the famous Inca Trail. The second day in the trail, we passed the highest point, Warmiwanusca Pass (13,776 ft), and then camped at Pacaymayo camp site. After dinner, stars were showing up in the clear sky, but not the moon. We all were very tired after the longest day in this trip; we climbed up 3936 ft then went down 1312 ft. Everyone got in their tents and prepared for next day's hike. I was the only one waiting for the stars

dancing in the sky. As the photo showed, we camped below the mountain and the stars were filling the sky between the mountains. Using the tents as foreground, I took about 5 or 6 images with slightly different setting. This is the only one came up what I like. The equipment: Sony A6000 with 10-18 mm lens (this is the new camera I pre-ordered for this trip, because it is light weight and good performance). Setting: 10mm (35mm focal length 15mm), f/4, 30 sec, ISO 3200.

After 4 days in Inca trail, we reached the world-known Machu Picchu. Then we started our easy tour to Lake Titicaca and then Amazon. We stayed in a small hotel in Maldonado next to the river. There were sev-

eral red-capped cardinal birds in the trees. They were singing and eating. The image showed is the adult (can't tell male or female) red-capped cardinal feeding the baby. The baby bird has yellow color in the head. The baby asked for food several times and finally got it. Due to limited time I was only able to capture few frames. Equipment: Canon 7D with 100 to 400mm zoom lens. Setting: hand held, 380mm, f/6.7, 1/500 sec, ISO 2000. All images were RAW file and processed with Photoshop CC and Nik.

Tanglewood Shed Seating



I used ISO 200 and HDR with 0.3 step up and down. Three images total. The HDR image did not turn out how I liked, but it did give me some nice color on the chairs. I realized the patterns looked better on the chairs than on the ceiling. Therefore, I cropped just the chairs and really liked the result. Then, I sent the pics to my friend Elizabeth to get some objective feedback. She was quick to complement but to also let me know that I should go back to the other side of the United States and retake the image with the chair in the center down. So I was quick to respond and removed the chair using Photoshop.

Then I was real happy with the image. I printed it in both color and black and white and generally liked the color one better. I found it interesting that even with the pattern nice and repeating that I entered it into the competition and did not notice that there were two chairs in the distance that were also down. I will correct that in any future competitions and prints. Regardless, I do like the nice warm resulting colors, patterns and leading lines. Even though the pick did not come out how I intended it was real nice to find a real nice image in these chairs.

- 4. Sam Shaw (Merced) "Post Processing"




21 members attended and enjoyed the presentations. Next meeting will be October 12th.

Sponsored by the Northern California Council of Camera Clubs (N4C) with the support of the San Joaquin Valley Council of Camera Clubs (SJVCCC) and clubs from the former Central California Counties Council of Camera Clubs (6C), FotoClave is an annual weekend conference begun in 1957 that offers extraordinary speakers for an entire weekend. Traditionally, it has two keynote speakers of national renown and a full day of educational talks by well-versed local photographers. In addition, FotoClave continues the practice of an annual photographic competition among the three councils in both prints and electronic images.
