September 15th Meeting to Feature Digital Workshops

Layers, Elements, and Slideshows Are Featured Presentations The September SJVCCC will feature the annual Digital Workshop on Sunday the 15th. Featured presenters will be **Sam Shaw FPSA, Shirley Ward**, and **Herb Spencer**. **Note:** this is the **3rd** Sunday – not the 2nd.



"Layers" will be presented by **Sam Shaw** which will ask what would Photoshop or image processing be without layers. Everything would have to exist on the same sheet of paper and would be two dimensional without allowing for location changes. You would still be able to crop, clone, and make adjustment to improve an image, and composition could be made, but once made and saved, it takes a lot of work to change. So, let's explore *Layers*, *Layer Masks*, and *Layer Blending Modes*.

Shirley Ward will show some basic how to tips in Elements as well as showing several creative images and how they can be done. The presentation will include techniques such as cloning, burning, dodging, and enhancing as well as using filters and simple layering.

In **Herb Spencer's** "How to Create a Winning Slideshow," you will well remember the obligatory attendance with all the other neighbors at "Uncle Fred's Vacation" slideshow – and how you said "Never again!" This presentation will show some of the tools and techniques used by the pros to make you want to see more outstanding shows – these are techniques that work for both neighborhood and PSA level audiences that work for both digital and 35mm film projected slideshows. There will be a follow-up question-and answer period for the presenters and general questions for any knowledgeable members in the audience.

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A Journey to Climb Mt. Whitney

Forty percent chance of thunderstorms in Sierra Nevada in the coming week – this was the forecast for the week of July 21. We had planned for a hiking trip to spend 6 days in national wilderness and climb Mt. Whitney. Everything was ready but the weather. However, we packed all hiking gear into my Jeep and headed to Lone Pine. After crossing Tioga Pass, we saw rain clouds covering every high peak in the Sierra Nevada. Our group had 7 persons including my wife and my son. Others were from Oregon,

tar Lake, but we had to cut it short to stay at Postcard Camp near Crabtree Meadows due to high risk of thunderstorms. From here we could see the summit of Mt. Whitney, but the mountain was covered by clouds. Everyone was worried whether we could summit Mt. Whitney the next day. We lowered our expectations; it would be a bonus if we could reach the summit. After everyone got into their tents, the clouds turned to a beautiful golden color for 5—10 minutes. I was able to capture some images (image 2). The creek you see in the photo is Whitney Creek. Looking at the summit, I knew that tomorrow would be the toughest day, not

Alabama and Stockton, California. In the afternoon of July 21, we started hiking at Cottonwood Pack Station. After 3 hours of climbing, we reached Chicken Springs Lake (image 1). We would spend our first night in the high Sierra at the elevation of 11,251 feet. As the forecast predicted, wind and rain hit our tents when we tried to sleep. But the next day was sunny with blue sky. We made a long contour entering Sequoia -Kings National Park and headed to Rock Creek Camp though PCT (Pacific Crest Trail). The rain started in the afternoon again and continued next day. We had to do everything in the rain. The third day, we packed our tent and climbed closer to Mt. Whitney zone. We were supposed to camp at Gui-

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only would we try to reach the highest point in the contiguous United States with an elevation of 14,505 feet, but we also needed to make up that day's shortage. We got up at 3:30 AM and started climbing at 4 AM with head lamps. The weather was excellent with the bright moon over the sky. This was the first time we walked in the wilderness in the early morning. Everything was so quiet and no one was talking. We all concentrated on the trail. After about 30 minutes, we turned off our head lamps and hiked under the bright moon light. It was a

peaceful experience to walk under moon light in wilderness. We reached Guitar Lake just before sunrise. The moon was still over the mountains. Twilight appeared above the mountain, then sun light painted over the mountains (image 3). This was so beautiful that no photography can duplicate it. From here, we were moving slowly but steadily toward the summit. After 4 hours of climbing, we finally reached the summit (image 4). We were so lucky to have 8 hours of good weather in Whitney zone. That day we hiked 15.7 miles with 3581 feet elevation gain. As we returned to the campsite, I looked at the summit in the same spot I took photos yesterday and still could not believe that we reached the summit and returned safely. Next day, we took it easy and got up late. We started our journey back to the station in the next 2 days. The last day, it rained even heavier, we all became soaking wet, but the sunset on Mt. Whitney was again golden color as seen



How I got Interested in Photography:

I am a retired Forester whose two main hobbies are now Shooting- guns and cameras. Since shooting guns is not a part of photography I will not pursue a discussion of this hobby, which has been a part of my life for more than 65 years (what, what did you say)? While serving in the Army of the United States in Japan I bought a cheap 35 mm camera. I took snapshots of everything as I traveled around the main island of Honshu. I learned that clouds were sometimes brighter than sunshine when I over-exposed my snapshots. I packed this little camera around for 15 years and took lots of memory pictures. Trips, marriage, work all got put onto film. Once in awhile a snapshot would look really nice. I didn't question why, I just accepted it. I was given a SLR camera as a gift one Christmas and boy could it take good pictures, much clearer and it had lots of adjustments I had to learn to operate.
